Receive presentation from Local Area Formation Commission (LAFCO)

Executive Officer regarding Municipal Service Review (MSR) process.

Recommendation

Receive presentation by LAFCO Executive Officer Mike Prater, review and discuss MSR questionnaire and responses. Provide direction to staff.

Policy Implications

The Local Area Formation Commission (LAFCO) is commencing a municipal service review for water, wastewater, recycled water and stormwater service agencies within Santa Barbara County. The LAFCO review process provides an opportunity for the District to consider current service levels and future direction.

Fiscal Implications

In near term, staff time to answer the questionnaire and track the process. In the long-term, LAFCO is the agency that controls activation of District latent powers, expansion and contraction of District services boundaries, and thereby the process can have significant fiscal implications.

Discussion

Mr. Mike Prater, Executive Officer for Santa Barbara County LAFCO will provide an overview of LAFCO and the Municipal Services Review Process (Presentation Notes Attached).

Santa Barbara LAFCO is made up of two members from the Board of Supervisors, two members from incorporated Cities within the County, two members from Special Districts within the County, and one member from the public at large.

On February 3, 2022, the Commission directed its staff to prepare an updated services review for water, wastewater, stormwater, and recycled water services within the County. The update process is scheduled to culminate at a LAFCO hearing in April 2023.

To initiate the update process, LAFCO staff sent a questionnaire to all agencies involved. The majority of the questionnaire deals with facts and figures regarding current District status eg. number of staff, facilities, finances, types of services. However, Section B. Boundaries and

Section L. "Other Information" deal with policy related topics such as plans for expanding or contracting services and/or boundaries.

The municipal services review and update process provides the Board an opportunity to outline a strategic plan for the District. Staff will summarize draft responses to LAFCO questionnaire and seek Board input and direction.

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Sphere Update and Service Review

■ Sphere Update establishes 20 year growth boundary for a jurisdiction

- Identifies areas that might be annexed in next 20 years
- Is a big picture view of growth for a jurisdiction

■ Municipal Service Review

- Information document
- Must address 7 factors;

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Purpose of an SOI

- To promote the orderly and logical growth
- To encourage provision of efficient services
- To discourage urban sprawl
- To encourage preservation of agricultural lands
- ■SOI helps organize services and development by identifying areas that might reasonably be served by a jurisdiction

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Spheres of Influence: Special Report

CKH Act definition of a SOI

56076. "Sphere of influence" means a plan for the probable physical boundaries and service area of a local agency, as determined by the commission.

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Municipal Service Review

Process:

- Information Gathering and Evaluation
 - Jurisdiction provides information upon request by LAFCO
- Prepare Draft Municipal Service Review/Sphere of Influence Update/CEQA
 - LAFCO Staff reviews and analyzes information
- Review/Revise Memorandum of Agreement with County and City
- Public Review and Comment Period
- Respond to comments-Prepare Staff Report
- LAFCO Hearings Regarding SOI/MSR

Municipal Service Review Cont.

- ■LAFCO analyzes study areas that may be considered for an SOI
- Typically, a SOI is the territory a city or district is expected to serve in the future
 - Jurisdictions are not required to annex SOI areas
- SOIs do not give a jurisdiction any more legal authority or regulatory control in an area
- ■SOI does not prevent development in the County
 - Landowner retains their property rights

- Existing uses or future development plans
- Size & development potential of parcels or need for services
- Topographical & physical considerations and constraints
- Jurisdiction's willingness to serve
- Jurisdiction's ability to serve
- Planning principles
- Legal agreements
- City and County General Plans

- Adopt written determinations 56425(e)(1-5)
 - Present and planned land uses in the area, including agriculture, and open space lands;
 - Present and probable need for public facilities and services in the area;
 - Present capacity of public facilities and adequacy of public services that the agency provides or is authorized to provide; and
 - Existence of social or economic communities of interest in the area if the Commission determines that they are relevant to the agency.
 - The present and probable need for those public facilities and services of any disadvantaged unincorporated communities within the existing sphere of influence.

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LAFCO Actions

- Incorporations: most recent in SB (City of Goleta in 2002); Jurupa Valley in 2011
- District Formations: Most recent Los Olivos CSD, Cuyama Basin & San Antonio WD
- Dissolution: most recent CSA 45 in 2009; SRHCSD voted down in 2015
- Disincorporation: vary rare- most recent in State so far = Hornitos by statute in 1973
- Annexations: most common
- Detachments: most often with reorganizations
- Out-of-Agency Service Agreements: to serve property outside the service area of a jurisdiction.
- Spheres of Influence/Municipal Service Review: every five years;
 Water/Wastewater/Recycled/Stormwater underway now
- Activate Latent Powers: SRHCSD taking about that now
- Consolidations/Mergers/Reorganization: Montecito looking into this

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LAFCOs Budget

- Adopted FY 21-22
 - LAFCO Budget FY 21-22 approved; total \$455,490; agency shares totaled \$437,690
- Proposed FY 22-23 draft \$616,700 agency shares \$580,565 Special District 1/3 portion \$192,247
 - April 7, 2022; Final on May 5, 2022
 - Budget is established by the Commission and is funded 1/3 by the Cities, 1/3 by the County/ and 1/3 by Special Districts. County Auditor uses the State Controllers Special Districts Annual Report to allocate charges based on revenues
